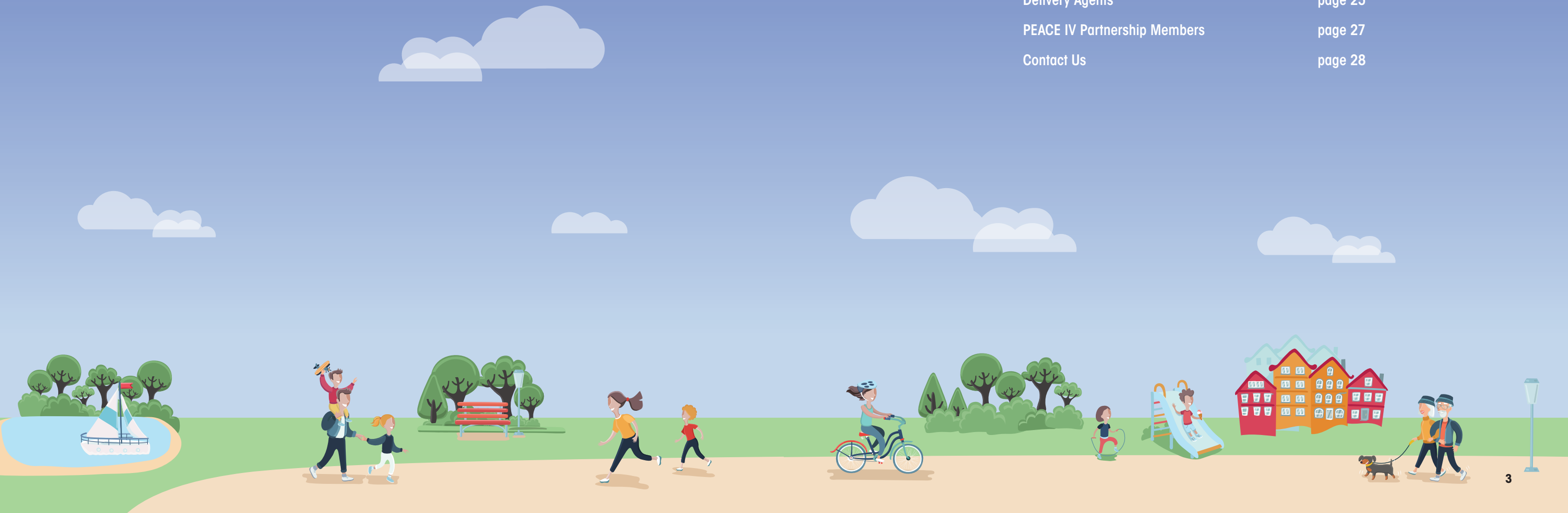

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# INTRODUCTION

The PEACE IV Programme, funded by the Special European Union Programmes Body (SEUPB), is a unique initiative of the European Union, which has been designed to support peace and reconciliation in Northern Ireland and the Border Region of Ireland.

## PEACE IV Local Action Plan

Preparations for the Antrim and Newtownabbey PEACE IV Local Action Plan began in early 2016 with an extensive consultation and engagement exercise which took place from March until August 2016. The PEACE IV Partnership was established in September 2016 before a detailed application, assessment and clarification process was undertaken between September 2016 and January 2017. A draft letter of offer was received from the SEUPB in January 2017. Between January and September 2017 the PEACE IV Partnership completed project design and development work, satisfied funder conditions and prepared programmes for procurement and delivery. Project procurement and implementation has followed a phased approach beginning in October 2017, with project delivery first beginning in January 2018. Projects will be completed by December 2019 with a programme wrap up period of three months (January to March 2020).

## Children and Young People (CYP)

Programmes under this theme aim to enhance the capacity of children and young people to form positive and effective relationships with those of a different background. A range of programmes are being delivered, including: Early intervention activities designed to build resilience and capacity; whole school based extracurricular activities; play based initiatives; leadership programmes; and life-skill development opportunities.

## Shared Spaces and Services (SSS)

Programmes under this theme aim to create a more cohesive society through an increased provision of shared spaces and services. The programmes promote a number of actions including: Exploring perceptions and barriers to shared spaces and services; addressing the manifestations and effects of historical division; developing the shared aspect of existing neighbourhoods, public spaces and buildings; increasing provision of shared spaces and services through new schemes; and the establishment of a virtual shared space initiative.

## Building Positive Relations (BPR)

Programmes under this theme aim to promote positive relations characterised by respect, where cultural diversity is celebrated and people can live, learn and socialise together, free from prejudice, hate and intolerance. Programme delivery includes: Dialogue opportunities; capacity building and engagement projects; cross-border initiatives; activities centred around key institutions; engagement of ethnic minority groups; leadership development; and building positive relations through sports, arts and recreation initiatives.

## Local Action Plan Funding

Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council is the lead partner for the Antrim and Newtownabbey PEACE IV Local Action Plan. The Council received three separate letters of offer from the Special European Union Programmes Body (SEUPB) on 24 August 2017. The letters of offer totalled £3,063,346.40 and were backdated to 1 June 2016 to ensure all project development work was eligible expenditure. This total allocation was split across the three eligible PEACE IV Local Action Plan themes as follows:

- Children and Young People (CYP) - £652,935.75
- Shared Spaces and Services (SSS) - £1,111,424.16
- Building Positive Relations (BPR) - £1,298,986.49

## Additional Funding Secured

The PEACE IV Partnership also submitted three modification requests to SEUPB between February and April 2018 which were presented to the SEUPB steering committee on 26 June 2018. On 30 July 2018, Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council received written confirmation that SEUPB has approved the following additional allocations. Three additional letters of offer followed confirming additional funding on 15 October 2018 as follows:

- Children and Young People theme  
Increased by £5,300.34
- Shared Spaces and Services theme  
Increased by £29,079.23
- Building Positive Relations theme  
Increased by £124,464.35

## Programmes and Projects

The PEACE IV Programme in Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council is delivered through an agreed Local Action Plan. Projects are delivered within the three main themes (Children and Young People, Shared Spaces and Services and Building Positive Relations) as follows:

**16 Programmes made up of 31 projects:**

- 4 x Children and Young People programmes made up of 5 projects;
- 4 x Shared Spaces and Services programmes made up of 13 projects;
- 8 x Building Positive Relations programmes made up of 13 projects.

**Of the 31 projects:**

- 18 are publicly tendered projects (all revenue based);
- 13 are Council led projects (8 x revenue, 3 x capital).

All figures and statistics are correct as of 31 December 2018.

# PEACE IV ACROSS THE BOROUGH

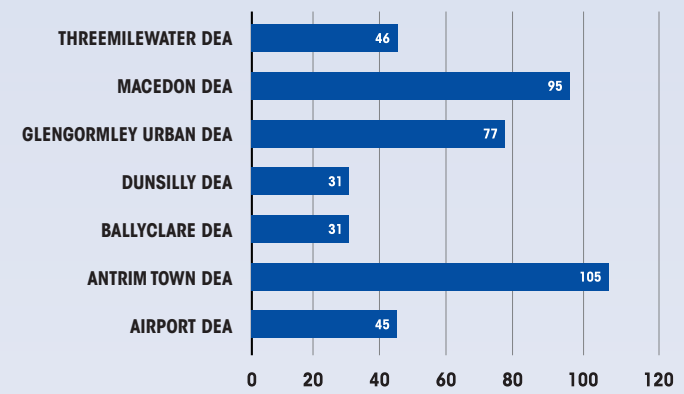
The Borough of Antrim and Newtownabbey is made up of 7 District Electoral Areas (DEA's):

The majority of PEACE IV Programmes are delivered with a DEA focus on recruitment and delivery. This reflects the variation of needs throughout the Borough, and allows programmes to be tailored to reflect the diversity and requirements of each area.

Delivery Agents for each programme work closely together in order to establish linkages and partnerships throughout the Borough and across DEAs.

Antrim and Newtownabbey PEACE IV Programmes have been designed to complement one another, encouraging participants to take ownership of their area and their abilities, as well as the opportunity to explore what's on offer further afield through cross-border programmes.

Participant target figures are mainly on a DEA basis. This is based on the population of the DEA, as well as the programme nature and scale. Delivery Agents take an "on the ground" approach; contacting and meeting with local groups, liaising with community workers and local organisations, and networking with other Delivery Agents and agencies operating in the area.



# CROSS COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AND TARGETS

The overarching purpose of the PEACE IV Local Action Plan is to increase cross-community engagement within our Borough and beyond. Each programme includes specified and agreed targets for levels of cross-community contact and engagement, measured through a range of attitudinal monitoring forms. The Special European Union Programmes Body objective for the PEACE IV Programme is to promote peace and reconciliation in Northern Ireland and the Border Region of Ireland.

## Children & Young People

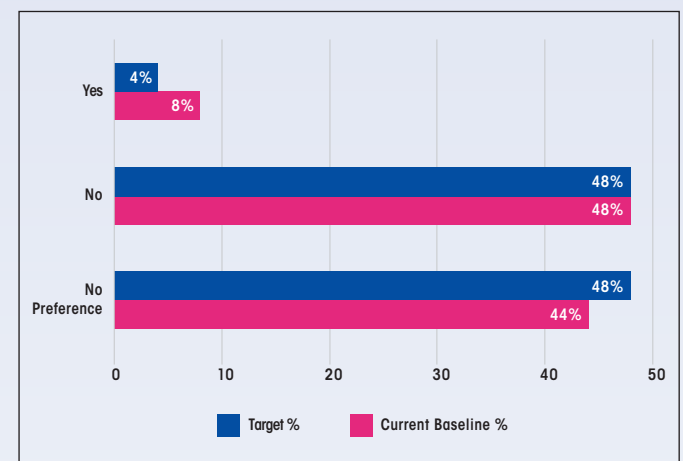
## Shared Spaces & Services

A decrease in people who would prefer to live in a neighbourhood with people of only their own religion.

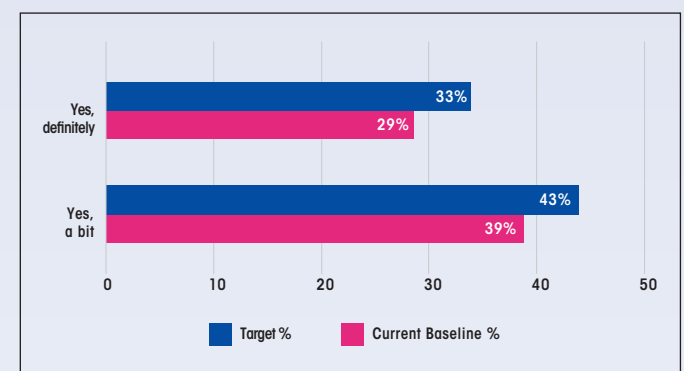


An increase in the percentage of participants who prefer to live in a mixed religion environment

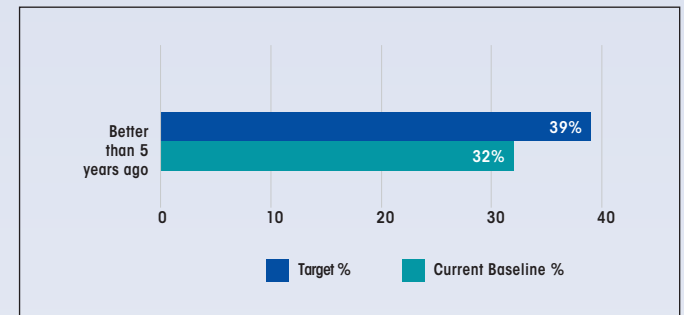


An increase in the percentage of participants who feel like the Antrim and Newtownabbey area feels like a shared space.

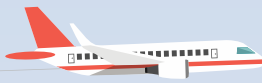


An increase in the percentage of respondents who know quite a bit about the culture of some minority ethnic communities.

## LIVE PROGRAMMES

### CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE

#### Leadership and Life Skills Programme delivered by Todds Leap Ltd.

Leadership and Life Skills Programme is an active citizenship programme aimed at young people aged 14 to 18 to build their team working, problem solving and leadership skills, empowering them to take greater control of their own lives.

##### What does this programme involve?

- Recruitment of 34 young people from each of the 7 DEA's;
- Development of a leadership, personal development and active citizenship 12 week programme in each of the 7 DEA's;
- Engagement with elected members;
- Engagement with community planning;
- Activities to promote citizenship, understanding cultural identity, respecting diversity, conflict management and mediation;
- A cross-community residential;
- An accredited OCN qualification;
- Utilising innovation and creative multimedia;
- Planning and delivery of a cross-community celebration event.

#### Reclaiming Play Spaces Programme delivered by Parks Section, Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council

This programme invests in 3 – 6 year olds and their families; aiming to develop resilience skills to address the negative pressures from others and increase their respect and appreciation of cultural diversity in the area. By doing so, this programme will help children form positive and effective relationships with others.

This programme also works with teenagers, training them to become play leaders for younger children within their communities.

##### What does this programme involve?

- Programme delivery in 5 play parks across the Borough; Crumlin, the V36, Steeple, Glengormley Park and Rathcoole;
- Up to 50 x 13 – 18 year old teenagers recruited in the programme through 3 taster play sessions in each of the parks;
- 8 play sessions planned for each of the 5 parks.



#### Moving Forward Together Programme

This programme delivers a Family Based Good Relations Programme at nursery, primary, post primary and special school level with a focus on promoting greater sharing, understanding and reconciliation between schools and school communities in the Borough.

The programme is completed on an extra-curricular basis and engages a range of participants including; Pupils, parents, guardians, teachers and support staff, PTA volunteers, and Board of Governors members. This programme works directly with two school Partnerships; Antrim and Randalstown Partnership and Newtownabbey Partnership.

##### What does this programme involve?

###### Antrim and Randalstown Partnership

- 25 children (3 - 19 years) per school, from a minimum of 18 schools, (9 Partnerships) to engage in a programme of cross community activity with at least 1 other school;
- 10 parent stakeholders including; parents, guardians, teachers and classroom assistants per partnership to engage in a programme of cross community activity with parent stakeholders from other schools;
- Project participants will aim to reflect a **60% / 40% cross-community split** for each partnership with a proportionate representation of ethnic minorities.

###### Newtownabbey Partnership

- 20 children (3 - 19 years) from 5 schools through the emerging Newtownabbey Partnership to engage in a programme of cross community activity with at least 1 other school;
- 10 parent stakeholders including; parents, guardians, teachers and classroom assistants per emerging partnership to engage in a programme of cross community activity with parent stakeholders from other schools;
- Engage and recruit an additional 5 schools to participate in the lead-in programmes;
- 10 parent stakeholders including parents and guardians, teachers, and classroom assistants per new partnership to engage in a programme of cross community activity with parent stakeholders from other schools;
- Project participants will aim to reflect a **60% / 40% cross-community split** for each pairing with a proportionate representation of ethnic minorities.





## LIVE PROGRAMMES

### CHILDREN & YOUNG PEOPLE

#### Respecting Difference Programme delivered by Early Years

This programme takes a 'Train the Trainer' approach and sees the development of age appropriate content (3 - 6 years) designed to help people understand the meaning of acceptance and respect for others, helping children to include others different from themselves.

The programme content promotes positive attitudes to physical, social and cultural differences amongst young children, practitioners and parents.

#### What does this programme involve?

- Recruitment of 60 participants including volunteers and practitioners working with children aged 3 – 6 years;
- Delivery of 5 cohorts of Train the Trainer programmes for 12 participants on 'Children Respecting Difference';
- 1 day mentoring support per participant post training;
- Resources provided for all participants;
- The delivery of a minimum of 4 Respecting Difference sessions by each participant post training;
- Organisation and delivery of a celebration event.

#### Out of Schools Life Skills Programme

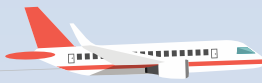
Out of Schools Life Skills Programme is aimed at disengaged 11 – 24 year olds who may be experiencing; Educational under-attainment, not engaged in education, training or employment or engaged in anti-social behaviour/criminality.

This programme includes a detached core element that incorporates on street work in the first instance. The programme is designed to include a mixture of personal development training, skills development and mentor support.

#### What does this programme involve?

- Recruitment of a minimum of 50 young people from each DEA;
- Sustained engagement with a minimum of 42 young people aged 11- 24 in each DEA;
- A personal development programme including accredited non-vocational skills training;
- Activities promoting citizenship, understanding cultural identity, respecting diversity, conflict management and mediation, volunteering and community engagement;
- Follow up mentoring support for young people;
- Cross-community residentials;
- Programme exit strategy to sign post and support participants into education, training or employment routes.





## LIVE PROGRAMMES



### SHARED SPACES & SERVICES

#### Community Connections Programme delivered by Blu Zebra Ltd.

Community Connections Programme offers the opportunity for 10 people per DEA to represent their area and reimagine or reinvent a public space within their community.

This programme addresses issues such as sectarianism and racism through the improved use of civic and shared spaces, aiming to enhance the existing urban infrastructure and environment in local communities.

##### What does this programme involve?

- Recruitment of 10 participants from each of the DEA's;
- Participant engagement and dialogue in each DEA;
- Representatives from each DEA will participate in good practice networking and site visits;
- Participants will identify at least 1 reimagining project per DEA.

#### Virtual Shared Space Project delivered by WheelWorks Ltd.

This programme explores shared spaces from within the virtual world. It will work with 30 young people to develop the ability of using technology together to share, learn, create and influence the shape of local areas.

##### What does this programme involve?

- An accredited programme for young people to be creative and use a range of multimedia and innovative technologies aimed at creating a Virtual Shared Space;
- A "Get Creative Family Day" in each DEA.

#### Addressing Manifestations Programme

This programme builds upon Community Connections Programme and includes dialogue opportunities with local communities, towns and neighbourhoods across 7 DEA's.

This programme enables participants to rethink and re-imagine the public spaces in their areas and consider how they could be more shared and welcoming to all.

##### What does this programme involve?

- Delivery of a programme to a total of 70 participants across each DEA exploring ways of addressing and tackling visible and invisible manifestations of sectarianism, prejudice and racism locally;
- 7 small scale environmental improvement and reimagining projects.

#### Shared Space Engagement and Events delivered by Leisure Services, Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council

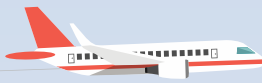
This programme will provide shared services with a particular focus on making better use of existing civic and shared spaces to create new opportunities for improved usage. The programme works with targeted stakeholder groups to co-design and deliver a series of activities and projects reflective of different age groups.

##### What does this programme involve?

- Development and delivery of a range of seven bespoke shared space engagement events developed to attract visitors and residents to V36 Park and other civic spaces within the Borough.







## LIVE PROGRAMMES



### BUILDING POSITIVE RELATIONS

#### Dialogue Programme delivered by Copius Advisory Services LLP

Dialogue Programme has been designed to initiate hard conversations aimed at building the capacity and resilience of participants to discuss contested spaces and undertake dialogue in safe places on hard issues.



This programme will involve 48 participants across 8 identified target areas. This programme includes a Resource Allocation that will enable groups to create a legacy project lasting beyond PEACE IV.

##### What does this programme involve?

- Recruitment of 48 emerging leaders from across the Borough who may be members of local community based organisations working within their target area;
- Training needs analysis completed for each of the participants;
- Facilitation of a capacity building for dialogue programme in each area;
- Facilitation of post capacity building dialogue sessions in each area;
- 3 shared events;
- 8 small projects to put learning into practice;
- Exit strategy to establish how participants can use their learning and understanding to benefit their community beyond the programme.

#### Capacity Building and Engagement Programme delivered by Local Economic Development Company (LEDCOM)

This programme includes an accredited and non-accredited element of a leadership, personal development and active citizenship programme in each of the 7 DEA's. This programme includes the opportunity to build leadership and teamwork skills.

##### What does this programme involve?

- Recruitment of 5 participant groups per DEA - 35 in total;
- 4 - 5 days of individual group mentoring support for all participant groups;
- Development of 35 'peace proofed' area improved plans;
- 10 days per DEA of collective participant mentoring and engagement sessions, focusing on the development and implementation of a peace building project(s);
- Delivery of 7 peace building projects; one per DEA, using the resource allocation budget available.



#### Cross Border Programme delivered by Community Services, Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council

This programme builds on previous links in Sligo County Council and a newly established link with Louth County Council. This partnership is based on its Eastern Seaboard location and experiences issues common to those of the Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council area.

##### What does this programme involve?

###### Sligo

- Recruitment of 15 participants from Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council and 15 from Sligo County Council;
- Exploration of community planning links with Sligo County Council with a specific focus on PCSP, Policing Committees, Good Relations Programmes and PEACE Partnerships;
- 1 Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council / Sligo County Council residential;
- 5 follow up development sessions for participants.

###### Louth

- Recruitment of 15 participants from Antrim and Newtownabbey, and 15 from Louth County Council;
- Exploration of community planning links with Louth County Council with a specific focus on PCSP, Policing Committees, Good Relations Programmes and PEACE Partnerships;
- 2 Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council / Louth County Council residencials;
- 7 follow up development days for participants.

#### Leadership Programme for Peace Building

This programme aims to build leadership skills of a range of different groups of people including; community leaders and emerging community leaders; particularly those who have not engaged in the programme previously.

The programme includes mediation and facilitation of dialogue training as well as skills around conflict management and negotiation.



##### What does this programme include?

- Recruitment of 20 participants to complete an accredited training in leadership and management;
- 3 day international good relations study visit and residential;
- Establishment of a mediation and dialogue and sharing skills forum;
- 5 joint projects utilising the resource allocation budget included within the programme.



## LIVE PROGRAMMES



### BUILDING POSITIVE RELATIONS

#### Growing Understanding Programme delivered by Institute for Conflict Research

This programme is delivered to 60 participants and is aimed at providing support to local groups; helping them build understanding, collaboration, dialogue, integration and connections between Black Minority Ethnic (BME) and the wider local community.

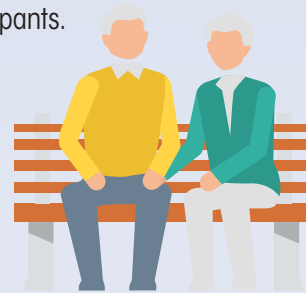
This programme includes a Resource Allocation for participating groups that will be used for growing understanding programmes delivered at a local level by participant groups.

##### What does this programme involve?

- Recruitment of 24 community representatives;
- 4 introductory workshops;
- 3 good practice projects, including one cross border;
- International study visit for 42 participants;
- Participants will produce an action plan for their local area;
- Delivery an end of programme celebration event.

#### Combined Key Institutions Programme delivered by TIDES Training Agency

This programme explores shared history locally with 200 participants. Projects will aim to increase awareness amongst communities about their own heritage and cultural identity and break down common myths.



##### Cultural Expressions Key Institutions Programme

- Programme will include a minimum of 30 participants from each of the three institutions; The Orange Order and Ulster Scots Groups, Uniformed marching bands, The GAA and Irish language community;
- 'Capacity Building and Leadership' training and 'Understanding Ourselves' for each institution;
- 3 shared dialogue events, bringing together all participants from across each of the three institutions;
- Mentoring support provided throughout for each institution;
- Each of the 3 institutions will come together to deliver a collective project;
- 7 participants from each of the institutions will take part in an international study visit;
- Organisation of an end of programme celebration event.

#### Cultural Expressions Williamite Programme

- Review existing resource manuals and develop additional training and supporting resources;
- Develop Williamite and Jacobite trail materials to support a programme trail;
- Re-engage and retrain 6 existing participants under CAN PEACE III, and recruit an additional 6 facilitators;
- Deliver the "12 weeks in 1690" programme to 36 or more participants;
- Facilitate 7 site visits to locations on the Williamite and Jacobite Trail;
- Organise and host a celebration event.

##### Key Institutions Cross Border Project

- Programme will include the recruitment of 15 participants from Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council, 15 participants from Sligo County Council and 15 from Louth County Council;
- 1 residential in Antrim and Newtownabbey and 1 residential in a cross border location;
- Smaller cross border visits, events and meetings.

#### Capacity for Dialogue with Church / Religious / Faith Groups delivered by Community Dialogue

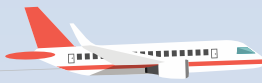
This programme is an interfaith inter-church programme delivered to 40 participants.



The purpose of the programme is to build church connections and explore and widen the role of the church and faith within peacebuilding.

##### What does this programme involve?

- A 6 week leadership development programme for 18 church leaders throughout all 7 DEA's;
- A 2 day residential for 18 church leaders and laity;
- Mentor support programme;
- Resource Allocation project for three identified areas.



## LIVE PROGRAMMES



### BUILDING POSITIVE RELATIONS

#### Sports Engagement Project delivered by Blu Zebra in Association with Sport Changes Life

This programme is delivered in each of the 7 DEA's, engaging a minimum of 15 young people aged 16 to 24 from educational, economic and social deprivation backgrounds in a sport, education and personal development programme.

##### What does this programme involve?

- Recruitment of a minimum of 15 young people from each of the 7 DEA's;
- 7 sports engagement programmes delivered over 24 weeks;
- 15 hours mentoring support per participant;
- Award of an accredited qualification in Sport and Good Relations for participants;
- Organisation of a celebration event at the end of the project.



#### Arts Engagement Project delivered by Artsekt Ltd.

This programme is delivered in each of the 7 DEA's, engaging a minimum of 15 people from each to explore peace building and cultural expression themes through the medium of arts and drama. Each DEA will have a resource budget of up to £2,500 for the development of a peace building arts project.

##### What does this programme involve?

- 7 arts engagement programmes delivered over 12 weeks;
- 6 mentoring support sessions per DEA programme;
- Award of an accredited qualification in Arts and Good Relations for participants;
- Organisation of an arts exhibition/celebration event at the end of the project.

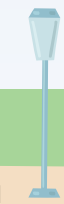
#### Recreation Engagement Programme delivered by WheelWorks Ltd.

This programme engages with a wide range of recreational groups across the Borough including cycling clubs, sailing clubs, fishing clubs and walking clubs.

The project will facilitate participants from across the Borough to come together through a recreational pursuit and personal development programme.

##### What does this programme involve?

- 15 people recruited from each of the 7 DEA's;
- 7 recreation engagement programmes delivered over 12 weeks;
- 6 mentoring support sessions per DEA programme;
- An accredited qualification OCN Level 2;
- 7 recreational projects utilising resource allocation budgets available within the programme;
- Organisation of a recreation/celebration event at the end of the project.



# CAPITAL PROGRAMMES

## Shared Spaces and Services - New Shared Space Programme delivered by Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council

The PEACE IV Local Action Plan features three main capital programmes under the theme of Shared Spaces and Services, directly delivered by Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council. This promotes a lasting legacy of PEACE IV within the Borough, providing facilities and attractions that will be enjoyed by residents and visitors for years to come.

### Antrim Grammar School / Parkhall Integrated College - 3G Pitch Project

The creation and development of a multi-usage 3G Pitch is a capital development programme jointly funded by PEACE IV and Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council. This facility will be located on the grounds at Antrim Grammar School and Parkhall Integrated College, Antrim. It is proposed that the facility will be used by schools during the day, and available to hire by sports clubs and teams in the evening and at weekends.

### V36 Urban Sports Park

The creation and development of an Urban Sports Park jointly funded by PEACE IV and Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council. The facility will be located within the V36 Park, Newtownabbey.

### Crumlin Glen

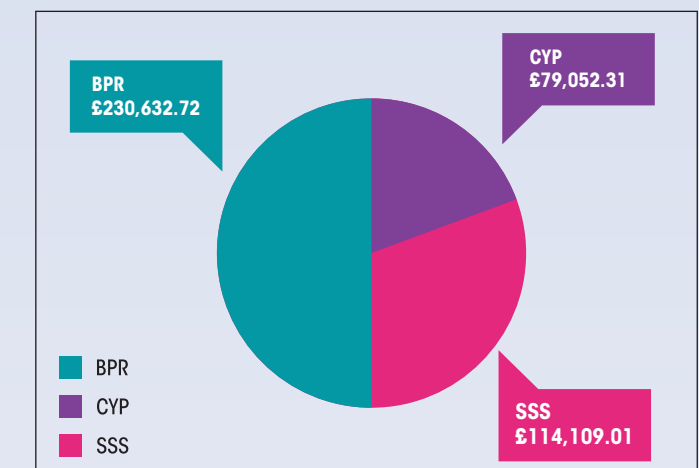
The creation and development of a natural play park within Crumlin Glen, Crumlin jointly funded by PEACE IV, Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council and Sport NI. This project will utilise a range natural materials, including; trees, branches, boulders and ropes to create items of play equipment to complement a larger shared space development project.

# FINANCE

## Financial claims are submitted by delivery agents on a quarterly basis and processed by the PEACE IV Secretariat and the Council's Finance Department.

This process enables Delivery Agents to submit financial claims as expenditure occurs, covering the cost of programme design, delivery and staffing. Similarly, claims are submitted by Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council to SEUPB using an Electronic Monitoring System (EMS). This allows the Council to be reimbursed for eligible programme running costs retrospectively.

# THE FUTURE OF PEACE IV



**The aim of the PEACE IV Local Action Plan in Antrim and Newtownabbey Borough Council is to build a sustainable legacy for peace building in the area.**

The activities delivered through the plan will create durability of the outputs and encourage local people to continue engaging in sustainable cross community and cross border opportunities. Learning throughout the planning and implementation phases demonstrates the recognition that peace building is everyone’s business and not just that of the PEACE IV Programme or the Council.

PEACE IV Local Action Plan projects also have built in sustainability aspects, including the preparation of good practice guides, resources, and train the trainer programmes to ensure a longer term delivery of the programmes beyond this PEACE programme.

Project steering groups from will help to make key stakeholder groups more aware of services available across the area, and how PEACE IV projects can be built upon, supported by the PEACE IV Partnership and its Working Groups.
